Erasmus Visit to Iceland by Sarajane Saville, Teacher

I was privileged to visit Iceland last week as part of the Erasmus programme. I highly valued the opportunity to meet professionals involved in education from other countries. I spent considerable time talking with people from Sweden and Estonia. We also had lots of interesting discussions with people from the UK.

I did a presentation about things of which I am particularly proud in our school. I included some drawings and written work from pupils in my class. Prior to the trip the area of learning in Literacy was Persuasive Writing and so the children were also able to express what they felt was good about their classroom and school.

We visited seven school sites, including two kindergartens. I was able to ask lots of questions from head teachers, staff and pupils. We had time as a group to discuss and reflect soon after each visit. Even during informal times such a meal times we were eagerly discussing what we had seen. I saw presentations from other schools. I was especially interested in the presentations about Icelandic education.

I feel the visit gave me the following:

- Confidence that what we do in our school is of a high standard.
- Enhanced motivation to ensure we try to teach children "to do what is right because they want to, not because they must" - a quote from an Icelandic Head.
- Determination to ensure children are spoken to calmly, with empathy, and that they are given freedom where appropriate.
- Some children need aids in order to have freedom and choice e.g. to communicate.
- Some would just benefit from a more relaxed approach and less rules about things that don't really matter.
- I'd also like to address healthy eating and emotional well-being. I'd like our schools to be more homely. I was struck, for

example, by nursery aged children eating boiled fish and fresh fruit, by people taking off shoes in school and by sofas in corridors.

- I was struck too by the emphasis on arts and crafts and creative subjects and by the way resources were repaired and children taught how to look after things.
- I was struck by the calibre of each of the smiling, welcoming, gracious head teachers. I felt they all had the well-being of their children uppermost. I agreed with the ethos they were promoting. I felt the quality of teaching and learning in each school was largely due to their influence and work, as indeed I feel about our own school.

If you would like further info please ask. I can chat for hours about this! I think I will always remember the visit and be influenced by what I saw and experienced.

I've sent you some photos of me on an aeroplane flying to Iceland. I looked out of the little window and saw clouds underneath me! It was amazing!




When we arrived I breathed in and straightaway I noticed that the air was different. It was like when it's just snowed- really fresh and clean sort of air. I'm very excited.


